Pack up and go...



Lovely Lisbon

is full of charm

HISTORIC — The city skyline seen from across the River Tagus

The shaky tram rattles noisily and slowly up the hill, then takes us down another hill, through the centre and back up to Barrio Alto, writes **YVONNE GORDON**. Along the way, we pass through Lisbon's historic centre and along back streets with rundown and crumbling buildings, the tram's bell ringing brightly as we wind around corners and bends.

With its old-fashioned wooden interior and its route through the historic areas of the city, the No 28 tram is one of the highlights of a visit to the Portuguese capital.

The one-carriage tram goes from one side of the city to the other, passing up and down the hills (the city is built on seven hills) and through the old parts of the city on the way.

We started with a morning walk in the Alfama area, the old Moorish neighbourhood, with its labyrinth of irregular streets and alleyways, filled with buildings all nearly piled on top of each other.

This is the home of Fado music and the legendary Fado clubs.

The area has elevated views over the historic centre of the city and the River Tagus, and the highest point is the Castle of São Jorge, which was built in the 10th century.

With its thick walls and ten towers, the hilltop fortress can be seen for miles around the city and it is also open to the public.

The tram goes down to Praça do Comércio, a large open square on the waterfront at the River Tagus, which is lined with small shops and restaurants with outdoor terraces — it's a great place to stop for a coffee or sunset drink.

The Praça is adjacent to the pedestrianised shopping area of Baixa (the lower town). Spend a few hours wandering around this area and you'll come across lots of old-style shops with retro weighing scales and cash registers, selling everything from coffee and tea by the weight, to sweets, chocolate and tobacco.

There are also plenty of clothes shops in the area and cafés where you can enjoy a pastel de Belém or pastel de nata — the traditional custard tart which Lisbonites love to have with their coffee.

A few minutes' walk — or take the Santa Justa lift up — the Chiado area is a lively district with shops, restaurants and theatres.

Nearby here, for nightlife, Barrio Alto is an experience, especially at weekends. 'Barrio' means neighbourhood and 'alto' means high — the name refers to the area's elevated position in the city and it can be reached on foot by funicular.

There's a selection of restaurants in the area, but it's the pubs and clubs that really take off around midnight, when crowds gather all along the tiny cobbled streets and alleyways (don't wear heels!) and move from bar to bar. It can be touristy and crowded but the atmosphere is buzzing.

Another great nightlife area is the Docas (docks) area near the river, which has restaurants and clubs.

Lisbon is easy to navigate — as well as trams and buses, the best way to get around is by Metro. You buy a rechargeable card for 50c at the metro station and then add as many trips as you like. Or a Lisbon Card (from €18.50 for 24 hours) gives you free entrance to museums and tours, as well as free transport on the city's buses and trams.

Lisbon is ideal for a city break, there is lots to see and do and it's small enough to get familiar with in just a couple of days.

We stayed at the Art Deco boutique hotel Hotel Britania, just off Avenida da Liberdade. It's designed in the style of 1940s glamour and has a relaxed charm, perfect after a day of sightseeing or a night on the town.
